EOF and SSS Program Opportunities

The *Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) Program* assists low-income residents who are capable and motivated but lack adequate preparation for college study. The program offers comprehensive support services in a student-centered environment to encourage the pursuit of academic excellence. Services assist program participants in becoming lifelong, independent learners with the tools necessary to graduate and transfer with the skills necessary to succeed in a competitive society.

EOF Eligibility Requirements and Get Application Here

The *Student Support Services (SSS) Program* is a comprehensive, federally-funded, academic support program designed to increase course performance, retention, graduation and transfer rates of first generation (parents who have no earned a bachelor's degree), low-income and/or disabled college students. The SSS Program customizes its services according to the academic needs and career goals of all participants. SSS participants have the unique opportunity to work one on one with counselors who are committed to their success. Services include individualized tutoring, academic advisement, career exploration, transfer assistance and cultural activities. General Studies vs. General Education Courses?

They aren't the same.

A *General Studies, AS* degree is designed for students who are undecided about a career and who wish to explore different fields. Nearly three-quarters of the required courses are traditional liberal arts and general education courses. The remaining courses can be in any subject area, but students should be aware that courses in specific career areas may not easily transfer. It is strongly recommended students meet with a counselor or Navigator to determine if this major is appropriate for what the student wants to do upon completion, in terms of education (transfer) and career goals. To do this, the students and their advisor may look into transfer programs to continue the student's education, as well as career assessments and employment outlook data for help selecting specific courses.

A General Education foundation aids a student in developing intellectual curiosity, a strengthened ability to think, and a deeper sense of aesthetic appreciation. The goal is to cultivate a knowledgeable and literate person. General Education learning involves knowledge acquisition, mastery of skills, critical thinking and the exercise of personal, social and civic responsibilities. All degree programs (AA, AFA, AAS, AS) will have an assortment of courses which support these skills. This is achieved through a coursework which introduces students to a variety of study areas include:

Communication – Written and Oral Communication to communicate effectively in both speech and writing.

Mathematics – Quantitative Knowledge and Skills: Use appropriate mathematical and statistical concepts and operations to interpret data and solve problems.

Science - Scientific Knowledge and Reasoning: Use of the scientific method of inquiry, through the acquisition of scientific knowledge.

Technology – Technological Competency/Information Literacy will address an information need by location, evaluating and effectively using information.

Social Science – Society and Human Behavior involves theories and concepts to analyze human behavior and social and political institutions and to act as responsible citizens.

Humanities – Humanistic Perspective analyzes works in the fields of art, history, music, or theater; literature; philosophy and/or religious studies; and/or the use of a foreign language.

History – Historical Perspective is an understanding of historical events and movements in World, Western, non-Western or American societies and assess their subsequent significance.

Diversity – Global and Cultural Awareness: Students will understand the importance of a global perspective and culturally diverse peoples.

Ethical Reasoning and Action – Students will understand ethical issues and situations.
