PREFACE

Atlantic Cape Community College is an open-access, comprehensive community college offering 47 undergraduate degree programs, including a dozen online degrees, and 32 certificate and professional series programs. With three unique

campuses in Mays Landing, Atlantic City, and Cape May Court House, we serve the residents of both Atlantic and Cape May counties. We are Middle States accredited and recognized as an Achieving the Dream Leader College and a Hispanic Serving Institution. We are home to the renowned Academy of Culinary Arts and the highly acclaimed Nursing program.

In 1964 Atlantic Community College (ACC) was established as the second community college in the state of New Jersey. ACC opened its doors to students in September 1966 using facilities rented from Atlantic City High School, and in February 1968, the College moved to its Mays Landing Campus location.

In 1982 the former Atlantic City Electric Company building, located in Atlantic City, was purchased by Atlantic County for Atlantic Cape. By 1984, a \$4 million renovation project transformed the building into the Worthington Atlantic City Campus.

In 1999, a request by Cape May County officials was approved for a jointure with Atlantic Community College. The College's name was officially changed to Atlantic Cape Community College. The Cape May County Campus of Atlantic Cape Community College opened its doors in August 2005.

At Atlantic Cape, we pride ourselves on our degrees that provide numerous career pathways, others designed for seamless transfer to four-year universities in New Jersey and beyond. We offer this through our partnerships with more than 30 colleges and four-year universities.

2024 marks the 60th Anniversary of the college's inception and the 40th Anniversary of our campus in Atlantic City. 2025 will mark the 20th Anniversary of the Cape May campus. As we hit these milestones, we remain steadfastly committed to ensuring our students receive the high-quality, accessible education they need to succeed. This includes the creation of new and innovative programs to prepare our students for the jobs of the future.

Certificate programs contain fewer semester credits than degree programs and certify students in a particular employment area. Credits earned through a certificate program may be applied to an associate degree in a related field or in general education. CENTER FOR WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Workforce Development at Atlantic Cape offers a wide range of certificate, certification, professional, and community education training programs to meet individuals' and businesses' needs in Atlantic and Cape May counties. Partnerships with local businesses and industry help ensure that industry needs for skilled workers and their employees' need for enhanced skills are being met. Classes are offered days, evenings, and weekends at all three College campuses and various locations throughout Atlantic and Cape May counties. Many programs are available online.

Adult Literacy and Integrated Education Programs

Atlantic Cape's Adult Literacy division delivers educational services for adults who seek to enhance their basic skills. Necessary skills enhancements allow participants to move into employment. Courses include Adult Basic Education, High School Equivalency (HSE) Preparation, and English as a Second Language (ESL).

Certificate and Certification Training Programs

Atlantic Cape offers over 40 Career Training Certificates and Certification Programs to prepare students for many career options. These programs are designed to help students obtain the skills required to begin a new career -- often in just a few short months. Programs are available in healthcare, technology, hospitality, gaming, and culinary. Experienced instructors utilize up-to-date equipment to provide a well-rounded curriculum designed for success. College credits upon successful completion may be earned for many programs.

Casino Career Institute

Atlantic Cape's Casino Career Institute (CCI) provides training and consulting services supporting the gaming industry for over 45 years. CCI was the first licensed gaming school in the nation to be affiliated with a community college. CCI offers dealer training, surveillance, and games protection training. Students receive hands-on training on our fully-equipped mock casino floor.

Career Services

The Career Services and Experienced-based Learning team are prepared to assist students with assistance with resumes and interview skills. The team also assists employers in connecting with students for employment and experienced-based learning opportunities like internships and apprenticeships.

Health Professions Institute

Atlantic Cape's Health Professions Institute (HPI) provides comprehensive healthcare training for in-demand careers. Phlebotomy, Certified Clinical Medical Assistants, Emergency Medical Technicians, and Paramedic Science Programs are available.

Professional Development and Community Education

Workforce Development provides various professional development and personal enrichment courses to meet Atlantic and Cape May County residents' interests and needs. The College offers a wide range of workshops and seminars to help busy professionals acquire additional credentials, certifications, and skills. Classes are offered days, evenings, and weekends at all three Atlantic Cape campuses and various locations throughout Atlantic and Cape May counties.

Retail, Customer Service & Hospitality

Workforce Development provides sales, customer service, retail management, front desk operations, and guest service training

Workforce Solutions (Training Services for Business)

Atlantic Cape's Workforce Solutions Programs deliver training specific to businesses and organizations' needs in Atlantic and Cape May counties. Professional trainers facilitate sessions on topics that assist businesses in meeting the demands of their challenging and competitive markets. Workforce Solutions also offers needs assessments and application assistance with N.J. Department of Labor's Workforce Development grant opportunities.

Wind Training Center

The Wind Training Center will provide the GWO Basic Safety Training w/Sea Survival. Over five days, the training will provide 40 hours of instruction in five areas (First Aid, Manual Handling, Fire Awareness, Working at Heights, and Sea Survival). The training program and supporting facility will be the first in the State and enable New Jersey to strengthen its leadership position in offshore wind energy. Atlantic Cape was awarded \$2.9M for the 1,700 square ft. facility. The New Jersey Offshore Wind Safety Training Challenge is a grant program administered by the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education with the support of the New Jersey Economic Development Authority.

H. MAJOR RESEARCH & PUBLIC SERVICE ACTIVITIES

1. SELECTED ADVOCACY, SCHOLARLY, PUBLIC SERVICE AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Advocacy

Dr. Barbara Gaba, President, Atlantic Cape Community College, worked to advance the College's mission through her advocacy work in her role of serving as the Co-Chair of the New Jersey Council of County Colleges (NJCCC) State & Federal Policy Committee which included the following:

On December 14th, the NJCCC, the state coordinating organization for the 18 community colleges submitted its annual State Budget to the Governor and the state Treasurer for \$189.1M in state operating aid for community colleges (an increase of \$20M from FY24). On January 10th, the NJCCC followed up with a letter to the Governor, signed by all community college Presidents. They then launched a Legislative Action Campaign. This included sending out an email for the Legislative Action Campaign to the college community, asking them to send letters to our state legislators to increase state operating aid for community colleges.

Implemented a budget strategy plan to restore \$20M to the Governor's budget for FY25, which included: Testimony by presidents and students at public hearings of both the Assembly and Senate budget committees and Presidents personally met with legislators. Their Legislative action campaign included Op Ed's in the local newspaper, TV coverage on the local news, and Social media (LinkedIn, Twitter/X).

Continued to advocate for the restoration of \$20 million to the community college sector in the Governor's Budget for the coming year. Attended another set of hearings with legislators on May 1 at the Assembly Budget Hearing and May 2 at the Senate Budget Hearing.

The National Legislative Summit (NLS) was held in February in Washington D.C. This annual event focused on federal advocacy priorities; and provided the opportunity to meet directly with members of Congress (and/or their staff) to discuss key issues impacting community colleges and our students.

Dr. Gaba along with, Trustee Byrne, Trustee Nguyen, and Jean McAlister attended the National Legislative Summit (NLS) - the premier Community College event that brought together more than 1000 community college leaders to Washington, DC to meet with Senators and members of Congress to discuss the critical need for and importance of community colleges. 1300 leaders attended from across the county including over 100 students. The NJ delegation included participants from 14 of the 18 community colleges. Trustee Nguyen made a presentation during their meeting with Senator Van Drew's staff where she focused on her experience as a student at Atlantic Cape as a testament to the vital role that community colleges play in our communities

Held a Summit in Atlantic City from June 11th to June 13th where Trustee Sandson presented at the NJCCC Summit on the Judiciary Opportunities for Success, JOBS Program.

Faculty Achievements

Featured poem by Rich Russell, Associate Professor of English, "Meanwhile, On Planet Earth" on The Eco Justice Project website. The EJP noted, "Rich Russell's poem reflected on the state of our planet – from the alarming impacts of rising atmospheric and ocean temperatures to the dangerous air quality caused by the Canada and U.S. East Coast wildfires. Explored the idea of an 'everyday apocalypse', a world that is both familiar and perilous, and how we are expected to uphold 'normalcy' under these grueling conditions."

Attended the 2023 NSF Advance Equity in STEM Community Convening, hosted at the Washington Duke Inn and Golf Club in Durham, North Carolina. Both the Advance Resource and Coordination (ARC) and the Women in Engineering ProActive Network (WEPAN) convened to bring together change-makers in higher education. Presented (Judith Otterburn-Martinez) at the International TESOL (Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages) Convention in Tampa, Florida on March 22nd. The workshop was titled: Fostering Teacher Growth through Collaborative Teacher Observation Protocol. As part of her work with the English Language Program of the US Department of State, she highlighted the best practices in conducting observations and creating a culture of collegiality and collaboration. She worked with another English Language Specialist, Kim Carroll, to showcase work they had done in Brazil, Paraguay, and Tanzania. Over 60 participants joined the workshop.

His fourth novel, The Ocean Hugs Hard, will be released on June 24, 2024, from Shadow Spark Publishing.

The outpouring of giving from such donors has allowed the Atlantic Cape Foundation to support thousands of Atlantic and Cape May County students over the past 57 years and given them the financial means to pursue their academic dreams.

<u>Athletics</u>

Hosted the southern venue portion of the 2024 New Jersey State Indoor Archery Championships in Jonathan Pitney Gymnasium on the Mays Landing campus February 3-4 as the Buccaneers' Archery team opened the Spring semester half of its 2023-24 season. This annual USA Archery event brought archers from New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, and Maryland, as well as Atlantic Cape and Rowan University, to the college to compete in nearly 30 categories.

Recognized the outstanding contributions of student-athletes at the 3rd Annual Athletics Banquet on May 14. Buccaneer student-athletes were recognized for their hard work, determination, and perseverance in the classroom as well as on the field this year. Each of the college's nine athletics program coaches and players were recognized and applauded for their Buccaneer spirit in 2023-24 along with many who worked tirelessly behind the scenes. Awards were presented to student-athletes for excelling in their respective sports. Members of the Men's Volleyball team were also presented with the Garden State Athletic Conference Division III champions plaque. The team earned this honor by finishing 9-1 in the conference and 11-4 overall in its first season of varsity competition.

Programs

Launched the PN Nursing program with 16 students enrolled in the first course. An initial accreditation site visit is anticipated to occur in May 2025

Developed a pilot internship program for Physics/Engineering at the FAA Technical Center

Added a new Associate in Science (A.S.) Physics degree program at its Mays Landing campus in Fall 2023.

Granted re-accreditation from The Accreditation Commission for Programs in Hospitality Administration (ACPHA) with stipulations for the full seven years (Winter 2023-Winter 2030) to The Academy of Culinary Arts & Hospitality Management at Atlantic Cape Community College.

Opened the Wind Training Center in March with three Basic Safety Training (onshore) courses

Held ribbon cutting ceremony to unveil the Dr. Alex Ernst Memorial Education Center at the Cape May County campus on May 10. This project was a coordinated effort between the Cape May County Board of Commissioners and the Atlantic Cape Board of Trustees. The \$1.2 million project will now allow the Zoo to provide high-quality educational opportunities for Cape May County residents and guests.

I. MAJOR CAPITAL PROJECTS

MAYS LANDING CAMPUS

Completed the One-Stop Construction Project in the J Building lobby on September 12. It serves as an inviting, modern, and attractive student-friendly venue to streamline the enrollment process and support students as they pursue their academic and career goals. It was completed on time and budget with a high level of quality and customer satisfaction. The \$1.5 million, 7,270-square-foot project, was paid for through the State of New Jersey's Chapter 12 funds and began immediately following the conclusion of Commencement ceremonies in May 2023. When students enter the J Building lobby they walk through the sliding glass doors into the One-Stop Welcome Center where they are personally greeted and asked to sign in at one of the many tablets available. They are then entered into a queuing system and notified via text message that a member of the One-Stop team is ready to help them. They then proceed into the admissions area, which features a new reception counter, 11 newly constructed offices, a copy room, a work area, a staff luncheonette, additional storage space, an exterior door, and a modified exit to allow for a uniform flow of foot traffic in and out of the One-Stop center.

Broke ground on the new \$1.48 million baseball field of dreams on February 15 that will permanently bring the Buccaneers' baseball program home in time for the 2025 season after spending the past decade playing its home games at Surf Stadium in Atlantic City. This was funded through the State of New Jersey and Atlantic County Chapter 12 funds, as well as the "Bring it Home" fundraising campaign in 2020 which thanks to the generosity of its donors raised \$186,000. After several years of planning, fundraising, architectural design, environmental approvals, and community and alumni outreach, construction upon the parcel of land is situated behind the Rutgers Lifelong Learning Center. Once completed, the new baseball field will feature a state-of-the-art digital scoreboard in center field, Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant bleachers along both baselines for spectator seating, two enclosed dugouts, and two 80'x30' bullpens. The field dimensions will measure 330 feet down the left and right field lines and 400 feet to straight away center field. Lights and a clubhouse, which were featured in the original architectural renderings, will be added to it at a later date.
